charter schools, NWSOTA was recognized for outstanding achievement in academics, leadership, attendance, and teacher retention, garnering one of the highest overall honors among likekind schools in the ACCEL network.

Northwest offers a robust Visual & Performing Arts program beginning in Kindergarten offering Theater, Band, Dance, Vocal Music & Visual Arts. Students can begin earning college credit in 7th grade through the College Credit Plus program. Additionally, the school offers many campus activities and events throughout the year to engage with families and the community.






STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS















ACADEMIC PROGRESS

NWSOTA increased performance by nearly 9% and achieved full academic recovery from the pandemic. The school significantly exceeded state expectations for student academic growth (5 Stars, Progress) sand in closing educational gaps (5 Stars, Gap Closing). Additionally, 123% of K-8 students achieved expected growth in Reading and 139% in Math (i-Ready assessment).




AVERAGE ANNUAL GROWTH IN READING & MATH
